## FLYING INTO THE RECORD BOOKS

Polly Vacher is no ordinary woman pilot. In 2001 she flew to the ends of the Earth and into the record books by becoming the first woman to fly the smallest aircraft around the world via Australia and the Pacific.

Polly's $46,000 \mathrm{~km}$ record-breaking journey began in January. It ended only three days behind schedule when she landed her Piper Dakota at Birmingham in central England in May, five months later. This included storms and a cyclone in Fiji, in the South Pacific Ocean. Polly did extremely well, considering that she only learned to fly a plane at the age of forty-nine.

One of the trip's most frightening moments came, worryingly, on the same route where Amelia Earhart, the American pilot, went missing when she was attempting to fly around the world in 1937. (34)
In fact, she allowed herself to be photographed as she stood beside a Banyan tree, which Amelia Earhart had planted in 1935, before setting off to the 16 -hour section of her flight from Hawaii to California.

According to Polly, all went well for the first part of her journey. (35) Then suddenly it started to get very bumpy. Checking the outside air temperature Polly discovered it was zero degrees. To her horror she found streams of ice-cold rain running back along the wings and starting to freeze. (36)

Though Polly immediately dropped her height to prevent weight of ice pulling her plane into the ocean, there was more drama when the cabin suddenly went quiet. Strong winds meant that she had used more fuel than expected. As a result, the main tank had run dry an hour early, but fortunately the emergency tank went into action and she was able to land safely.

The lonely hours spent flying were a great contrast to the warm welcome which she received when she landed. (37) The publicity she attracted also raised money for charity which provides flying scholarships for disabled people.

## RALEIGH INTERNATIONAL

Raleigh International began in 1978 with the purpose of running youth projects from ships circumnavigating the globe. What began as a short project grew into a permanent operation with volunteers of all ages coming from all over the world. Now read about the work of its volunteers.


FELICIA ROYAARDS
Felicia, from the Netherlands, joined a Raleigh International overseas programme to Costa Rica after finishing her high school diploma: "I've just finished high school and next year I'm going to university. I thought Raleigh would be the best opportunity to take a gap year and see more of the world. I've learned a lot working with people from a mix of different backgrounds. I appreciate and am proud of my culture much more than I was before. As well as working with these people it has opened my eyes to a much bigger world than my own. People around the world have their own opinions and beliefs and that should be respected. You appreciate little things in life and realise you don't need luxury. Happiness is set in the kindness of people, not in things."

## B REBECCA TORRY

Rebecca was already a qualified doctor and had participated in the overseas programme to Costa Rica and Nicaragua as a programme doctor: "Having worked as a doctor in England for three years without a break, I decided to take three months out to do something different. Someone recommended Raleigh International's overseas programmes for my sons and in researching it I saw that Raleigh needed medics too and I thought 'Why not me too?' As a medic, my responsibilities were broad, ranging from training both staff and programme participants in health, hygiene and first aid to providing on site medical support. I also relied heavily on the medical and telephone consultation skills from my experience as a doctor in England. More generally, my wide experience as a parent and teacher helped me to educate the young people. An ability to cook for large numbers, meanwhile, proved unexpectedly valuable."

## $C$ AMIRYA YAHAYA

Amirya, 21, from Kuala Lumpur in Malaysia, took a break between completing her degree at university and finding work, to join a Raleigh programme in her own country. She says: "I heard about Raleigh International through my Careers Advisory Service at University. As a Malaysian, I wanted to find out more about different aspects of my country. I also wanted to see how I reacted when put in different, quite extreme, situations as well as playing different roles within a team of individuals. One of my jobs was to act as a go-between for the group and the local community, which improved my knowledge of translating and the different ways of life in my country. I also learnt the basic skills of working on a building site. One of my most enjoyable moments included seeing the new kindergarten for a local village go up."

## $D$ HOLLY MURPHY

Holly, 20, Canadian, took a break after her studies to join a Raleigh overseas programme: "I was looking for volunteer work abroad and came across Raleigh International on the Internet. I didn't really know what to expect, apart from the fact that it was likely to be hard work. I hoped the programme would give me a much better understanding of my strengths and weaknesses and would give me the opportunity to develop my abilities to work in a team as well as improving my leadership skills. For the first few days I found life in the programme fairly difficult. It took me some time to adjust to the accommodation, Malaysian culture, homesickness, fatigue and various other differences. My highlight was socialising with villagers. They gave me a skirt, made me a necklace and often gave us lunch. On a personal level I feel I have improved my communication skills, and find that I now listen to others more readily before speaking."
